Curtiss R. Avery, born on October 23, 1933 in Old Town, Arkansas, was born the fourth child of eight children to Mrs. Lizzie Avery and the late Willie.

As a teenager, Avery moved North to Buffalo, N.Y. to finish his formal education at Hutchinson Central High School. Upon graduation in 1953, he enlisted in the United States Air Force where he was a Staff Sergeant and in 1954 attended Officer Training School at Port Smith Air Force Base, Port Smith, New Hampshire.

Avery met and fell in love with Rose Marie Brown. On December 1, 1956, they established a marital union that was to remain for 34 years.

He was employed at International Multi-Food Inc., where he quickly rose to become the first black Master Millwright. In 1972, he became an electrician and was in the I.B.E.W. Local No. 41. In 1982, Curtiss became a member of the Paramount Lodge No. 73, Prince Hall Free and Accepted Masons.

Curtiss was a loving, devoted husband and father who strived to conduct his life in a manner befitting a man of character and dignity. He often visited Bethel A.M.E. Church with his wife and children.

Curtiss leaves to forever cherish his memory a loving wife and four children: Curtiss R. Jr., of Buffalo, N.Y., Dr. William Kevin Avery, of Washington D.C., Gloria (Joy) Stovel, of Yuba City, CA., and Carla Ansley of Buffalo, N.Y.; two grandaughters: Rianna Marie Avery and Chevonne Renesse Avery; seven brothers and sisters: Evelyn Fuller of Los Angeles, CA., Joseph (Betty) Avery of Elaine, Arkansas, Nina Mae Henderson of Elaine, Arkansas, Willie J.
