

Stephanie Amodeo, Richard Frieman, Dr. Mitchell, Davide Bana, and Nathan Marshall presented talks about their work on and related to the geochemistry of cores from the Mohawk Valley in eastern New York. Alex O'Hara, Tayler Schweigel, and Dr. Jacobi presented work on the structure of the Mohawk Valley in the second technical session honor Dr. Jacobi.

Myself, Jennifer Crammer, William Caffee, Erica Doody, and Sandrine Duboscq presented posters on our research. Bill spoke about beryllium dating of the last deglaciation of Clear Creek Valley, Colorado. Jenny's poster was about the quantifying exchange between surface and ground water using drones. Erica used pollen as part of a multi-proxy approach to look for Late Pleistocene climate events in Western New York. Sandrine's poster was about determining Holocene hydroclimate based on hydrogen in leaf waxes, and I presented on synonymies of graptolite taxa.




