Call for Papers

The Graduate History Association (GHA) of the University at Buffalo is placing a call for papers for the first issue of its peer-reviewed Graduate History Journal, to be published in summer 2022.

The goal of the journal is to highlight the work of graduate students in the History department and enable them to share their work with fellow students and faculty members of the department.

In keeping with the goal of highlighting research from a wide range of topics, time periods, and locations, the journal will not have a guiding theme. While submissions to the journal must be historically oriented in nature, we encourage scholars to broaden the view of what constitutes scholarly research. We welcome projects that include (but are not limited to):

- Traditional research papers (maximum 6,000 words)
- Historically-oriented reviews of books, films, or other forms of media (maximum 1,000 words)
- Reviews of recently published historical monographs (maximum 1,000 words)
- “State of the field” essays
- Public history/teaching history in the classroom

We especially encourage submissions that incorporate original primary source research. As this journal will be published exclusively online, we also welcome digital history projects. All submissions must adhere to the citation and formatting guidelines of the Chicago Manual of Style.

Please note that scholars with accepted non-review projects will be asked to peer review at least two, but no more than three, other accepted submissions to the journal.

Proposal Instructions

Please send your proposal via email to ghajournal2022@gmail.com, which should include:

1. A 300-word abstract outlining the nature, argument(s), and methodology of your project
2. Your contact information

The deadline for paper proposals is January 29th, 2022.
